

DR. BELLAMY'S LECTURE STIRS UP INTEREST IN CIVIL DEFENSE

The scientist awakened many as to the need for civil defense. . . he labeled atomic weapons as "city killers" . . . the manufacture of thermonuclear weapons turns out to be less difficult and expensive than earlier estimates . . . each pound of inexpensive additive for the H-bomb has the destructive power of the Hiroshima bomb . . . it can have power of 20 million tons of TNT which would result in severe damage of an area 22 miles across . . . as Chief of the Radiological Services for the State Office of Civil Defense, he also told of the danger of radiological fall-out, even in Santa Barbara. It was a very enlightening, if not frightening, evening.

In a highly coordinated and detailed operation, the 50,000 volumes in the Riviera campus library will be moved to the million dollar building on the new campus at Goleta. Several hundred lemon boxes will be borrowed from the local packers to transport the volumes. This portion of the move is expected to be completed in five working days. During the week of August 16 the remainder of the campus offices will be shifted to the new quarters and by the end of the month the Riviera campus will be entirely vacated.
