#24 Gauchos Drop Two Out of Three

Pitcher Seth Bean Shuts Out UNLV

UCSB baseball fans who watched last weekend's series between #24 UCSB and #25 UNLV must have come to only one conclusion: The old saying that pitching is twothirds of baseball is prob-

ably right. On Friday, fans at Cae-sar Uyesaka Stadium witnessed one of the Gauchos' (25-13 overall, 7-5 Big West) worst pitch-ing performances ever, as the Rebels (34-12, 8-4) pounded four Santa Bar-bara pitchers for 22 runs in a 22-4 victory, snapping UCSB's seven-game win-ning streak. On Saturday, UNLV won once again, 7-4

On Sunday, however, Santa Barbara got back on track when UCSB sophomore starter Seth Bean (8-2) hurled a magnificent eight innings of shutout ball in a 5-2 Santa Barbara win

"We played really well," said UCSB Head Coach Ken Preston. "They tested us a little on Friday, but we came back, won on Saturday, and we clinched second place," he said. "I'm very happy to be hosting the first round of playoffs.'

On Friday, the Cougars (7-12 overall, 8-14 in the MPSF), put up a fight in the second and third games before falling to Santa Barbara 15-6, 15-11, 13-15, 15-4.

"Our outsides had some trouble on Friday," Preston said. "Morgan Chap-

On Saturday the Gauchos came out hard, taking the first two games 15-8, 15-6. Softball Squad Drops a Pair of Games on the Road to the 49ers

They just couldn't buy a run. Long Beach State leads the conference with its 1.77 ERA, and the UCSB softball squad found out firsthand on Saturday why the 49ers are so stingy as the Gauchos failed to get a player across home plate in either game of the doubleheader on the road.

The result was a 6-0, 1-0 sweep of Santa Barbara (16-20 overall, 5-13 in Big West play) at the hands of LBSU. In the process the 49ers (27-16, 15-5) gave up only seven hits along the way.

"They were tough, but we just weren't hitting," said UCSB center fielder J.J. Cannon, who doesn't believe the losses will carry over into the Gauchos' next game. "I think when we lose, we don't really dwell on it. You just have to look forward to the next game because there's just no point in dwelling on the loss."

In the first game of the two-game set, Long Beach was able to get to Santa Barbara starter junior right-hander Kacie Ontiveros (6-8), who gave up six runs on 10 hits in her seven innings of "[Long Beach State] just hit her hard. It was one of those days," said UCSB

Head Coach Liz Kelly. Ontiveros had been giving solid outings for the Gauchos of late, but after LBSU scored a run in the bottom of the first inning, 49er first baseman Amanda Adams crunched a 200-foot, two-run homer to break the game wide open.

homer to break the game wide open. In the nightcap, junior right-hander Megan O'Brien kept Santa Barbara in the game as she held Long Beach at bay for the first five innings. However, after an error by UCSB junior shortstop Alysia Hendricks that allowed a runner on base, the miscue came back to haunt the Gauchos.

With the runner on third and one out in the sixth frame, a 49er hitter smacked a medium fly ball that Cannon ran down and fired for home to get the tagging base runner at home. But the ball came loose from junior catcher Johnna Mike's glove to allow the only run of the ballgame, giving O'Brien (4-5) the loss.

"[We're] good about letting the first game go, whether we win or lose. But [LBSU] threw a three-hitter and that's not going to work," Kelly said. "We need to get back on track hitting."

Freshman David Uris (2-1) got the start and gave

Friday was not a happy day for UCSB hurlers. The UNLV lineup knocked around four Gaucho pitchers for 28 hits and 22 runs, nearly tying the team's record for most runs allowed (23), set back in 1963 against UC Berkeley.

Junior starter Bryan Noyes (5-2) was the most unfortunate of the Santa Barbara pitchers, losing only his second game of the season. Noyes had earned a complete-game victory at UOP a week ago and had been the squad's hottest pitcher. On Friday, however, Noyes allowed eight hits and eight earned runs without recording an out, raising his ERA from 4.56 to 6.85. Junior reliever Jorvic Salazar also had a rough outing, allowing 13 hits and nine earned runs in six innings. Salazar's ERA jumped from 4.76 to 6.08.
