Ellen Cummings-

Goal: Working to find a place for re-entry students.

Rachel Doherty--

Goal: To increase diversity among students who have been accepted to UCSB. An overnight program, called "Let's Spend the Night Together." Low income and under-represented high school Juniors and Seniors are invited to come and "see" UCSB through our eyes. They will get a campus tour, eat and sleep on-campus, and go to classes with a UCSB student in their intended major. Rob Fetterman--

Goal: To create an intensive public relations campaign between the student body and A.S..

Goal: Minority faculty and staff recruitment and retention.

Goal: To increase participation in Associated Student organizations and increase the voter turn-out.

Jason is working with the Academic Affairs Board and would like more student input and suggestions. He is also working on the creation of the A.S. International Exchange Committee.

Craig Fok--

Goal: To show students the fun of involvement. To help students realize that they are very fortunate to attend UCSB and shouldn't miss opportunities to get involved in college activities. Also, to have a greater voter turn-out. Last year only 27% of UCSB students voted in the elections. One of my special projects for this quarter is to host an Associated Students UCSB 1990 Party. During this event, I hope students will think about the 1990's and how they can improve themselves as people. A person can improve him/herself by getting involved and learning about his/ her environment. Upon graduation, I hope you don't say, "Awh, I should have gotten more involved during my college years!"

Jerelyn Johnson--

Goal: To have all nine UC Campuses voice their support in discontinuing the UC Management of Livermore and Los Alamos Nuclear Weapons Laboratories. A referendum will be put on the Spring Ballot so students can vote to urge the Regents to discontinue their management of the Labs. Jerelyn, Lobby, and Amy Supinger are working toward getting all other UC Campuses involved in this vote.

Al Klein--

Goal: Student empowerment training workshop weekend.

Michelle Koskella--

Goal: A successful UCSB Drug Awareness Week. The main purpose of this week is to heighten awareness regarding the drug problem.

April 16-20 is Drug Awareness Week, and Michelle is in charge of this event. She is working on getting various speakers of all beliefs to attend. She hopes to have a strong debate between those who want to legalize drugs, and those who do not.

Wade Lawrence--

Goal: To increase voter registration in order to pass SCA 1 which will keep student fees from raising astronomical amounts. If SCA 1 doesn't pass, student fees may raise 20% higher annually. State Constitutional Amendment #1 (SCA 1)--Allow the state to raise gasoline tax and trucking fees to fund highway and mass transit projects. It will also modify the Gann Limit (cap on state spending that increases each year only to keep pace with the cost of living and population increases) so it is more in line with the available revenues, linking the limit to growth and personal income rather than an increase in the cost of living.

Melanie Ogren--

Goal: To provide outreach and networking to students about Associated Students through a new program called A.S. I.N.F.O., which stands for Associated Students Information Network for Outreach.

There are several ways A.S. INFO will work to provide outreach: 1) Presentations about A.S. to campus groups and residence halls. 2) Letters to students to keep lines of communication open.

3) Card contacts and suggestion boxes to obtain student input and initiate student involvement.

In general, Melanie wishes to create means for students to participate and have a say in what A.S. does since A.S. is students working for students.

Recycling Effort Launches into 1990 A.S. promotes conservation and re-use for the new decade

n its first year of existence, the A.S. Recycling Committee, headed by Uzi Daniel, has made remarkable headway in the fight against our waste disposal problem.

Starting with the UCen as its pilot locale, they've already turned in hundreds of bottles, cans, and newspapers for recycling efforts. Currently they oversee 18 small bins and four dumpsters in the UCen, and plan to expand to the entire campus in the 90's.

They have just recently hit upon their first major snag, however. At this point in time, the contributions are consistently more than the existing manpower can effectively handle on a monthly basis. The committee foresaw this hazard and hired a Recycling Coordinator to overcome the inevitable onslaught of newspaper and other recyclables, but unfortunately, due to injury, he was forced to resign. Hence, the position is open and applications are being accepted for the job. Once this is overcome, though, the effort will

continue in its march towardthe future.

Included in its plans for growth, is incorporation of the many departments that already have their own recycling program in operation. The plan will start programs in the remaining departments, and include large buildings such as the Events Center, Robertson Gym, and others. These goals are long-range, and would be the committee's priority for several years to come.

1990 Law now requires all nine UC campuses to have recycling programs. UCSB was one of the few to already have implemented a program.

The committee has gained support from the Community Environmental Council (the C.E.C.) of Santa Barbara. This organization has been responsibefore nearly all the recycling efforts in Goleta and Santa Barbara for the past several years. Isla Vista is soon to be incorporated due to its developing interest in recycling efforts.

Most recently, the California State legislature became involved in the effort by passing a law requiring the UC Regents to have some sort of recycling program instituted on all nine of the U.C. campuses by Jan.1, 1990. This is a unique step, in that it singles out the U.C. system in the drafting of the law. U.C.S.B was one of the few campuses to already have a program in place at the time of the implementation of the law.

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The committee has made a genuine first step in solving a large scale problem at the local level. Now it is facing the future with a determined glare, ready to tackle any new problems that may develop. As always, any students wishing to help in the effort may come to the A.S. Office, on the third floor of the UCen and inquire about working on the committee.

CALPIRG Works for Local, Global Environmental Awareness

n the 50's, it was goldfish swallowing. The 60's saw the love beads and bell bottoms that made it famous. Then it was disco and polyester in the 70's. The 80's exuded yuppyism and Jim Bakker. Now, it's beginning to look like environmentalism could be a momentous fad that sticks through the 90's to make some real and progressive change on social and legislative level. With this, more and more citizens are taking heart and time in getting involved with the now reflourishing movement.

The California Public Interest Research Group, or CAIPIRG, is a group that enables students to enact both social and political change on the serious environmental, consumer, hunger, and homelessness issues that face this country today. Inspired by Ralph Nader in 1970, the non-profit and nonpartisan group has grown to become the state's largest environmental and consumer group. It provides students on this campus and three others-UCLA, UCB, and UCSC-with an experienced staff of advocates, lobbyists, researchers, and organizers that allow students to really "make a difference." Just last quarter, CALPIRG's campaign kickoff meeting hosted 220 UCSB students. Presently, the organization is working on the Earth Day 1990 project where different environmental issues are addressed monthly. The idea is to first educate the members and others about the problem so that they can work towards solutions for them. These issues include some of the leading

-save the world's rainforest -pass the laws to protect Californians from pesticide poisoning -reduce the use of toxics -prevent ocean pollution

Room 1179 edge environmental dilemmas that face us today: rainforest depletion, toxic pollution, pesticides on our food and in our water, and global warming. Right now, CALPIRG is working with a coalition to qualify a ballot initiative for the November vote called the Environmental Protection Act of 1990. It addresses the issues of pesticides, forest depletion and oil spills within the state, creating an unprecedented opportunity for Californians to alter the state's direction and attitude toward the environment.

So, why does this organization draw in such a large volume of student participation and activity? Simply, CALPIRG provides unparallelled access to statewide networking, staff and resources to students that want to make change in the societal and environmental problems they see. Personally, this organization allowed me to work on environmental issues and really influence state politics to get behind innovative legislation. I also developed my leadership, organizational and public speaking skills far beyond what I had thought I was capable. I can now see a better future within which I can actively influence our elected officials to make responsible and progressive change.


